1. PROJECT DETAILS

1.1. Project Objective

Providing affordable, quality dialysis services to patients in parts of India where there is limited/non-existent dialysis infrastructure

1.2. Need Assessment / Problem Statement

Chronic kidney disease (CKD) is seeing an alarming increase in India with an estimated 1.3 million patients requiring dialysis 2-3 times a week to survive. CKD will soon be the 5th leading cause of death in India. What's alarming is that 35% of Diabetic & 20% of the Hypertensives above the age of 20 years will develop CKD and may need dialysis.

Against the requirement of approx. 200,000 dialysis machines, merely 25,000 are available – a majority restricted to urban India. The exorbitant dialysis cost at Rs. 2.4 lacs per year escalates significantly in remote locations – a factor of transportation of the patient, accompanying family member and loss of earning hours. Given the acute demand-supply imbalance, dialysis slots are frequently unavailable with the extensive waiting list leading to patient drop-off and increasing deaths.

With COVID-19 pandemic the access to dialysis closer to home without much travel has gain primary importance preventing infection for the immunocompromised dialysis patients & also creating specific dialysis facility at covid centre for offering dialysis for COVID-19 patients needing dialysis
